**Course Title: Roman Law**

**Course Credits:12**

**Language of Instruction: Albanian**

**Course Description:** The course aims to provide students with the foundations of Roman private law, and of some key institutions of the civil tradition. Having a historical dimension, it helps to develop student's awareness of the story of law and the need for a critical approach, showing the sophisticated techniques of argumentation of Roman jurists. It forms the basis for subsequent studies of Roman law, history of medieval and modern law, private law.

**Course Goals:** The goals of the subject consist in giving students the opportunity to better understand the birth, development and dogmatic configuration of private law institutions in the different contexts in which the Roman legal experience took place. Following the traditional systematic analysis, the subject of the course are: law and its partitions; the regime of individuals and the family; facts and legal acts; the trial and defense of rights; property and property rights; the bonds; the successions; donations.

**Course Requirements:** The student's obligations consist of active participation in seminars, as well as in the preparation and defense of the course assignment.

**Grading:** The final assessment will be 100 points which will be divided into:

Points attained through course assignment that are 30 and are attained by activation in seminars and the 70 points earned in the final written exam.

**Course Schedule:** 135 hours divided in lectures and seminars.
